Places to explore

A SITE WITH INTEGRATED FACILITIES

Situated at the heart of the Grand Site de France, the Pont du Diable visitor centre is there to welcome you, provide you with information, help you find a place to park, offer free shuttle buses for tourists in summer (to ease congestion in the Hérault Gorges) and footpaths. A Grand Site de France

In 2010, the "Saint-Guilhem-le Désert - Gorges de l'Hérault" site was awarded the "Grand Site de France" label.

Awarded by the state, this label recognises sustainable management and conservation in a high-profile listed site which attracts large numbers of visitors. To obtain it, sites have to carry out restoration and development work.

Its action programme, which focuses on sustainable development, involves managing visitor numbers, providing ecofriendly transport options, creating visitor centres (such as the Maison du Grand Site de France). restoring cultural heritage, protecting natural environments and landscapes, showcasing local products, etc.

River and riparian forest

Forming an important ecological corridor, they are home to a wide biodiversity: eels, fish (chub, perch, etc.), dragonflies, bats, otters, kingfishers, grey heron... The riparian forest protects the riverbanks from violent floods, purifies the water, etc.

2 Grassland

Sunny open environments are vital for the survival of many different species and are popular pollination sites. Meadows provide a perfect habitat for birthwort, butterflies, reptiles...

3 Oak grove

Around the Mediterranean, the shade of oak trees provides a cool environment for a large number of species: passerines, reptiles, forest insects, mammals... A forest pond is also home to frogs and dragonflies.

1 Pebble beach

It looks like a mineral desert, withstanding the violence of floods, yet it is still home to plants suited to this type of environment (Welsh poppy, etc.)
